


**J DiCamillo**     **Flora and Ulysses: the Illuminated Adventures**


**J McDonald**     **Stink and the Midnight Zombie Walk**

Discusses animal droppings and their uses, importance, and meaning.





**J743.896 S** Robots!: Draw Your Own Androids, Cyborgs & Fighting Bots by Jay Stephens
