Sergeant James Milton Johnson November 11, 2004

While attempting to subdue a neighbor who had started shooting people in the neighborhood, Reserve Sergeant Johnson was shot and killed. During the same incident another deputy was wounded and two civilians were killed by the gunman.



Captain Jack ("Red") Conrad Renigar May 30, 1975

A reserve officer, attempting to apprehend a suspect who had shot and killed Deputy Wayne Gaither of the Davie County Sheriff's Office, was shot and killed. The suspect had been cornered in a small convenience store and was exchanging shots with the officers. Captain Renigar was shot by the suspect as he stood up from his covered position to warn a couple that had pulled into the parking lot of the store not knowing what was happening.




Deputy Sheriff Ernest Wilson Walters February 23, 1966

While serving a civil process, Deputy Walters asked the suspect to secure her dog to prevent it from getting out of the house. The woman retrieved a shotgun and shot Deputy Walters.

Deputy Westmoreland was stabbed to death while making an arrest.



Deputy Sheriff Linder Newsome February 23, 1929

While in pursuit of a vehicle occupied by thieves, Deputy Newsome's patrol car crashed.





#### CALEA

Forsyth County Sheriff William T. Schatzman announced that on July 31st the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc. (CALEA) advised the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office that it had passed all of its reviews and examinations and was awarded Law Enforcement Accreditation.

CALEA was created in 1979 through the combined efforts of four major law enforcement organizations: the International Association of Chiefs of Police, National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives, National Sheriffs' Association, and Police Executive Research Forum. These organizations continue to serve in an advisory capacity and are responsible for appointing members of the commission's board.






## Forsyth County Sheriff's Office Personnel Years of Service



# Budget & Finance

The Forsyth County Commissioners adopted a budget for Fiscal Year 2009-2010 of \$393,443,253 for Forsyth County Operations. Allocated for Public Safety from the operations budget was \$61,530,528 and as part of the Public Safety group, the Sheriff's Office Adopted Budget for FY 2009-2010 was \$40,930,449 with expected revenues of \$7,567,907.

#### Sheriff's Office Expenditures





## Records





The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office began using the NCAWARE (North Carolina Arrest Warrant Repository) in March of 2010. The web-based system is designed to help authorities issue and track warrants across jurisdictions for wanted persons in the state. Deputies and Telecommunicators can immediately check to see if any person with whom we have contact has an outstanding warrant or criminal summons. Training to use the NCAWARE system is now part of the initial new hire orientation program.

The Forsyth County Records Section is responsible for a variety of office support tasks. These tasks vary from data entry to quality assurance checks to ensure all documents are complete and accurate. The Records Section reviews all incident reports submitted via Mobile Field Reporting. They are the final review before the incident reports are accessible to the public. They also receive and house all arrest re-

ports, citations, and warning tickets. These items are received and entered into our Records Management System. They are also responsible for the data entry of subpoenas. After the subpoenas are entered, records staff makes service attempts with the defendant/person by telephone.




# Fingerprinting Percentage Comparison 2006-2010

Forsyth County Sheriff's Office Fingerprints by Month - 2010




## Pistol Permits

2010 Pístol and Conceal Carry Permits by Month





### Civil and Criminal Process

The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office is responsible for the service of a wide variety of criminal and civil processes throughout the incorporated and unincorporated areas of Forsyth County. These processes include, but are not limited to warrants, orders for arrest, subpoenas, and all domestic violence protective orders. One area of process service that has seen an increase in 2010 is foreclosures due in part to the economic climate. In 2010, the Civil section of the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office served 6,381 foreclosure papers to 2,594 addresses. This is an increase in addresses of 13% and increase in papers of 16% over 2009. The map below shows points where foreclosures were served in 2010.



#### Domestic Violence

In 2010 there were 2,240 domestic incidents. 1,103 of those were criminal and 1,137 non-criminal. From those totals, there were 148 Part I incidents and 969 Part II Incidents. There were 192 incidents where children under 12 were present. Domestic Violence 50B arrests totaled 53 in 2010. Our agency responded to 3,152 domestic violence calls in 2010.

#### DID YOU KNOW?

- One in every four women will experience domestic violence in her lifetime.
- An estimated 1.3 million women are victims of physical assault by an intimate partner each year.
- 85% of domestic violence victims are women.
- Females who are 20-24 years of age are at the greatest risk of nonfatal intimate partner violence.
- Most cases of domestic violence are never reported to the police.
- Almost 1/3 of female homicide victims that are documented in prior law enforcement records are killed by an intimate partner.
- Intimate partner violence results in more than 18.5 million mental health care visits each year.
- One in six women and one in thirty-three men have experienced an attempted or completed rape.
- There are 16,800 homicides and \$2.2 million (medically treated) injuries due to intimate partner violence annually, which costs \$37 billion nationally.\*

#### To report domestic violence in progress, call 911.

Forsyth County is home to the Safe On Seven Domestic Violence Center which began operation in October 2005. The center derives its name from its multi-agency approach to providing services for domestic violence victims on the seventh floor of the Forsyth County Hall of Justice. Fortuitously, the abbreviation of Safe On Seven

is S.O.S., the international distress code for a cry for help. The main number for the Safe On Seven Domestic Violence Center is 336-779-6320. The Center's hours of operation are from 8:30 a.m. until 4:00 p.m.






# Sex Offenders

In 1947, California became the first state in the US to have a sex offender registration program. In 1994, a federal statute called the "Jacob Wetterling Act" required sex offenders in all states to register with state registries. Then in 1996, "Megan's Law" required states to mandate public notification of personal information for certain sex offenders.

You can check on our website for wanted sex offenders that have failed to register or just look up your street or zip code to find the sex offenders in your neighborhood. In January 2010, the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office launched a new safety program for teens.

Named "Fatal Vision®", the pro-

gram is designed to teach teen drivers the perils of driving while impaired. The most vivid way to teach the impairing effects of alcohol and drugs is to allow participants the opportunity to experience what impairment feels like.



On July 9th the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office was the recipient of the Annual Care Bear Ride donation sponsored by the Honda Goldwing Road Riders Association. These teddy bears are distributed to children in need or who have been exposed to a crisis situation.

# Specialized Teams



The Forsyth County sheriff's Office Tactical Action Response Team (START) participated in a statewide competition at the NC Justice Academy in October. The team trained and competed with other tactical teams from across the state. They place 9th overall and 3rd in the "Rolling Thunder" and "night Operations" event. This is a specialized unit which provides strategic assistance to operations initiated by deputies. These operations include incidents such as riots, high risk search and high risk arrest warrant service, armed barricaded suspects, hostage taking, sniper and active shooter incidents.

In April 2010, the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office Canine Unit participated in an open house event at Oldtown Veterinary Hospital featuring local Animal Heros. Oldtown donated 20% of event sales to participating Animal Hero groups and chose to raise funds to purchase a canine vest for the sheriff's office canine unit. Since the funds donated from the event were short of the required purchase amount, Dr. Schroeder and his staff at Oldtown Veterinarian Hospital launched a fund raiser to collect the remain-

## Community Policing - Clemmons

There were 11,621 Calls for Service in the Village of Clemmons in 2010. There were 244 calls for service where there were no available officers to dispatch. There were 272 arrests and 1,724 criminal charges. 47% of those arrests by Clemmons officers. Infractions numbered 1,337 and 93% were issued by Clemmons officers. 2,481 incidents and 59% handled by Clemmons officers. The average response time to all calls by Clemmons officer was 10:31, to priority P, 4:05, and to priority 2 and 3 calls, 10:44. Average Response times by other officers; priority 2 and 3, 11:30, emergency priority, 4:52; all calls 11:32.

# Community Policing - Lewisville

The town of Lewisville had 4,619 Calls for Service in 2010. One hundred and twenty-one of those calls for service, there were no available officers to dispatch. There were 153 arrests and 218 criminal charges. Lewisville officers made 45% of those arrests. Infractions numbered 132 and 69% were issued by Lewisville officers. They handled 47% of the 1,140 incidents that occurred. # What Are Policemen Made Of?

Don't credit me with the mongrel prose: it has many parents-at least 420,000 of them: Policemen. A Policeman is a composite of what all men are, mingling of a saint and sinner, dust and deity. Gulled statistics wave the fan over the stinkers, underscore instances of dishonesty and brutality because they are "new". What they really mean is that they are exceptional, unusual, not commonplace. Buried under the frost is the fact: Less than one-half of one percent of policemen misfit the uniform. That's a better average than you'd find among clergy! What is a policeman made of?

- ~He, of all men, is once the most needed and the most unwanted.
- ~He's a strangely nameless creature who is "sir" to his face and "fuzz" to his back
- ~He must be such a diplomat that he can settle differences between individuals so that each will think he won. But...If the policeman is neat, he's conceited; if he's careless, he's a bum. If he's pleasant, he's flirting; if not, he's a grouch.
- ~He must make an instant decision which would require months for a lawyer to make. But...If he hurries, he's careless; if he's deliberate, he's lazy.
- ~He must be first to an accident and infallible with his diagnosis.
- ~He must be able to start breathing, stop bleeding, tie splints and, above all, be sure the victim goes home without a limp. Or expect to be sued. The police officer must know every gun, draw on the run, and hit where it doesn't hurt.
- ~He must be able to whip two men twice his size and half his age without damaging his uniform and without being "brutal". If you hit him, he's a coward. If he hits you, he's a bully. A policeman must know everything-and not tell.
- ~He must know where all the sin is and not partake. A policeman must, from a single strand of hair, be able to describe the crime, the weapon and the criminal- and tell you where the criminal is hiding. But...If he catches the criminal, he's lucky; if he doesn't, he's a dunce. If he gets promoted, he has political pull; if he doesn't, he's a dullard. The policeman must chase a bum lead to a dead-end, stake out ten nights to tag one witness who saw it happen-but refused to remember.
- ~The policeman must be a minister, a social worker, a diplomat, a tough guy and a gentleman. And, of course, he'd have to be genius.... For he will have to feed a family on a policeman's salary.
