#### **COUNTY MANAGER'S RECOMMENDATION OR COMMENTS:**

#### SUMMARY OF INFORMATION:

On May 4, 2020, the Governor signed House Bill 1043, the 2020 COVID-19 Recovery Act, into law which established a Coronavirus Relief Fund to appropriate relief and assistance from the effects of COVID-19. As part of the Coronavirus Relief Fund, \$300,000,000 was allocated to a Local Government Coronavirus Relief Reserve, half of which will remain in the State's General Fund to be appropriated to local governments if they experience a revenue shortfall and the federal CARES Act is amended to allow the use of federal funds for that purpose. The other half will be allocated to counties ineligible to receive direct funding from the federal Coronavirus Relief Fund established by the CARES Act (every County except for Wake, Mecklenburg, and Guilford).

From this other half, Forsyth County will receive \$6,470,065, which can be used for necessary expenditures incurred during the period of March 1, 2020, through December 20, 2020, due to the public health emergency related to the Coronavirus Disease 2019 that were not accounted for in the most recently approved budget as of March 27, 2020. Federal guidance indicates that expenditures can be related to medical expenses, public health

## RESOLUTION APPROVING FORSYTH COUNTY'S CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND PLAN AND ITS SUBMISSION TO THE NORTH CAROLINA PANDEMIC RECOVERY OFFICE

WHEREAS Congress passed and the President signed the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act on March 27, 2020, establishing the \$150 billion Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) for state, county, and municipal governments of which North Carolina received \$4,066,866,000;

**WHEREAS** the North Carolina General Assembly passed and the Governor signed Session Law 2020-4 establishing a North Carolina Coronavirus Relief Fund that appropriated North Carolina's allocation of \$4,066,866,000 to various recipients of which Forsyth County received \$6,470,065;

**WHEREAS** Forsyth County must submit a plan to the North Carolina Pandemic Recovery Office, a part of the Office of State Budget and Management, in order to receive and spend the \$6,470,065 to address necessary expenditures incurred due to the COVID-19 public health emergency; and

**WHEREAS** the County Manager recommends that the County's CRF funds be used as follows:

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** by the Forsyth County Board of Commissioners that the Chairman or the County Manager and the Clerk to the Board are hereby authorized to submit, on behalf of Forsyth County, the County's Plan, in substantially the same form as attached hereto, to utilize its \$6,470,065 allocation of the North Carolina Coronavirus Relief Fund to the North Carolina Pandemic Recovery Office.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** by the Forsyth County Board of Commissioners that the Chairman or the County Manager and the Clerk to the Board are hereby authorized to execute agreements, on behalf of Forsyth County, with vendors and other parties to use the CRF funds for the purposes set forth above, including acquiring, providing, and distributing various supplies and services, pursuant to NCGS 143-129(e)(2) or otherwise as required by law, and executing interlocal grant agreements with the municipalities in Forsyth County, subject to a pre-audit certificate thereon by the County Chief Financial Officer, if applicable, and approval as to form and legality by the County Attorney.

#### FORSYTH COUNTY, NORTH CAROLINA AMENDMENT TO 2019-2020 BUDGET ORDINANCE

FROM: BUDGET & MANAGEMENT MEETING DATE: May 28, 2020

#### **EXPLANATION:**

On May 4, 2020, the Governor signed House Bill 1043, the 2020 COVID-19 Recovery Act, into law which established a Coronavirus Relief Fund to appropriate relief and assistance from the effects of COVID-19. As part of the Coronavirus Relief Fund, \$300,000,000 was allocated to a Local Government Coronavirus Relief Reserve, half of which will remain in the State's General Fund to be appropriated to local governments if they experience a revenue shortfall and the federal CARES Act is amended to allow the use of federal funds for that purpose. The other half will be allocated to counties ineligible to receive direct funding from the federal Coronavirus Relief Fund established by the CARES Act (every County except for Wake, Mecklenburg, and Guilford).

From this other half, Forsyth County will receive \$6,470,065, which can be used for necessary expenditures incurred during the period of March 1, 2020, through December 20, 2020, due to the public health emergency related to the Coronavirus Disease 2019 that were not accounted for in the most recently approved budget as of March 27, 2020. Federal guidance indicates that expenditures can be related to medical expenses, public health expenses, payroll expenses, actions to facilitate public health measures, expenses associated with the provision of economic support, and other COVID19 related expenses.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE FORSYTH COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS THAT THE FISCAL YEAR 2019-2020BUDGET ORDINANCE IS HEREBY AMENDED AS FOLLOWS:
