# State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds 2021 Report

## Forsyth County, North Carolina 2021 Recovery Plan

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#### **GENERAL OVERVIEW**

#### **Executive Summary**

Forsyth County has a historic opportunity to make transformational strides in this community for all of our citizens through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding. The County was awarded over \$74 million of which half was already received. The County will solicit input from the public to aid the Board of County Commissioners in determining the appropriate use of funds to promote a fair and equitable response to the pandemic and economic recovery. The County will also provide application periods where persons, businesses, or organizations within the County can apply for funding as long as it meets an allowable use as set by the United States Treasury. By taking into account citizen feedback and the proposed projects or programs, the Board will determine a plan for the use of funds that will impact the County and its citizens in a transformational way that helps the County recover from the significant impacts related to the pandemic. The Board plans to have this developed by the end of the Fall.

#### **Uses of Funds**

As explained in the Executive Summary, the County is currently in the process of determining the appropriate use of funds for the most impact and to support a strong and equitable recovery from the pandemic and related economic downturn. During this process, the priorities for spending will emerge and be identified within the following categories and potentially across multiple categories:

- a. Public Health
- b. Negative Economic Impacts
- c. Services to Disproportionately Impacted Communities
- d. Premium Pay
- e. Water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure
- f. Revenue Replacement

During the fiscal year 2021-22 budget process, the Board did approve some spending related to Category F. Revenue Replacement. According to the provided revenue replacement calculation, the County determined its revenue loss was \$18 million. The Board appropriated the full amount within the current year budget, but the spending plan is to spend one-third, or \$6 million, each year beginning in the current budget year. The funds can be used for general government services, but the Board approved spending for public safety and emergency services purposes.

The City of Winston-Salem and Forsyth County have received federal funds under the Emergency Rental Assistance Program through the American Rescue Plan Act to assist low-income residents who are behind on their rent or utilities payments because of the COVID-19 pandemic. The two local governments administer the program together and have been awarded over \$12 million when combined.

#### Promoting equitable outcomes

Since the County and the Board of County Commissioners are currently developing their spending plan and priorities, there is currently no structure in place to track the intended outcomes to promote equity using qualitative and quantitative data on how the County's approach achieved or promoted equitable outcomes or progressed against equity goals.

The Board did include the following goal in its current year budget ordinance: "The Board of County Commissioners hereby encourages applicants to focus on the Qualified Census Tracts with the hope that 80% of the funds available in the process will reach our most marginalized populations."

#### **Community Engagement**

On July 1, 2021, the County made the American Rescue Plan Act Citizen Survey available on its website at <a href="https://www.forsyth.cc/erap/arpa.aspx">https://www.forsyth.cc/erap/arpa.aspx</a>. County residents are asked to review the information provided on federal guidelines about how the money can be spent and then provide input on what they would like to see the County use the funds for. The Board of County Commissioners will consider the survey results when determining how the funding will be allocated during the application and award periods. This survey will remain open until all funds have been allocated for allowable purposes. On a more informal basis, Commissioners and County staff have fielded many questions from constituents through person to person conversations and email communication in their daily course of business. As noted in the previous sections, the Board of County Commissioners encourages applicants to focus on projects and programs within Qualified Census Tracts with the hope that 80% of the funds available in the process will reach the County's most marginalized populations.

#### **Labor Practices**

Labor practices will be updated if any infrastructure projects are approved by the Board of County Commissioners.

#### **Use of Evidence**

While no programs have been awarded funding by the Board of County Commissioners to date, the County is asking each applicant whether their prospective program includes evidence-based interventions. If awarded programs include these type of interventions, the results will be provided here.
